## Mother-to-be My Baby Baby finally makes the grade

In her 30th and perhaps final career start, My Baby Baby earned that elusive first graded stakes victory, gamely holding off a couple of late challenges to score a neck victory in the \$113,900 Early Times Mint Julep Handicap (G3) on June 11 at Churchill Downs.

Saving her best for last, the six-year old Bernstein mare prevailed in the 1 $\frac{1}{8}$ -mile turf event while in foal to two-time Horse of the Year Curlin on a February 12 cover.

Bred in Kentucky by E. H. Beau Lane III, also breeder of her dam, My Baby Baby was purchased at the 2006 Fasig-Tipton Kentucky fall yearling sale for \$50,000.

She is one of three winners from as many starters out of the unranked Wavering Monarch mare Sarah Darling, a half sister to Italian two-year-old high-

weight and 2006 Oaks d'Italia (Ity-G1) winner Dionisia, by Tejano Run.

Further back, our subject's female family contains little of note. In fact, My Baby Baby and Dionisia are, by far, the most celebrated members of their tail-female line since the former's seventh dam, On Hand, produced 1943 handicap co-champion Market Wise and 1943 Coaching Club American Oaks winner Too Timely.

My Baby Baby hails from the fourth North American crop of the versatile Storm Cat sire Bernstein, flagship stallion for Castleton Lyons in Lexington.

A smartly bred multiple Irish Group 3 winner, Bernstein spent his first seven years at stud shuttling to Argentina, where he was the country's leading sire in 2006 and 2007. His son, Storm Mayor, became the first back-to-back winner of South America's most prestigious race, the Gran Premio Carlos Pellegrini (Arg-G1) in 60 years and was named Argentina's 2006 Horse of the Year.

My Baby Baby's pedigree represents another textbook example of the virtues of inbreeding to the family of the sire. In this case, Bernstein traces back to his fourth dam, the outstanding racemare and matron Busanda, a key granddaughter of the premier American matriarch \*La Troienne.

Victress in the 1950 Alabama Stakes, the 1951 Suburban Handicap as well as consecutive runnings of the grueling Saratoga Cup in 1951 and 1952, Busanda, by War Admiral, is best known as the dam of the great runner and sire Buckpasser, who appears in our subject's pedigree as the broodmare sire of Wavering Monarch.

Inbreeding to Busanda is, indeed, a recurrent pattern among Bernstein's best offspring. So far, five of his 11 North American graded stakes winners have been out of broodmares carrying Buckpasser blood.

Bernstein, similarly, enjoyed a disproportionate level of success with his Argentine-bred runners when he was crossed with the daughters and granddaughters of the Buckpasser stallion Egg Toss.

Just playing to one's strengths, complements of \*La Troienne's long and influential reach.
